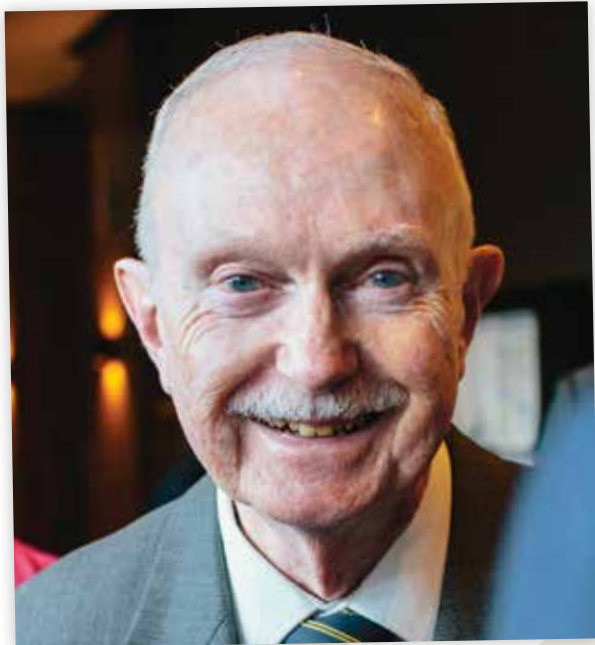
We have high expectations but these are exceeded by your care and tremendous input as parents, and the energy and commitment of our school committee.

PETER FROST CELEBRATING 50 YEARS OF DISTINGUISHED SERVICE



This year Mr Peter Frost celebrates 50 years of distinguished service to Waverley College. Peter's story hails back to his own schooling at Waverley College, from where he graduated in 1964. Thereafter he attended the University of New South Wales where he completed a Bachelor of Arts, followed by a Diploma of Teaching from the Alexander Mackie College. Throughout these years of study, Peter had retained a connection to the College through the Cadet Unit, of which he was a Volunteer Officer.

His inspiration for becoming a teacher can be attributed to a number of experiences he had as a student at the College. In his senior year he chose French as a subject and was required to teach it to younger classes. As a young Corporal, he had to prepare lesson plans and teach other Cadets, something that sparked Peter's passion for passing on knowledge to others.

At University, Peter excelled at History, and was at one point encouraged to take the path to becoming a university history lecturer. However, Peter had a strong desire to become a teacher at Waverley. Fresh with newly obtained qualifications, he approached the College's then Headmaster, Brother Simmons, to be interviewed for a teaching position. This proved successful and Peter commenced in 1969. His first classroom was what had previously been the old Chapel attached to the now demolished Airmount building.

In addition to a full teaching load, Peter also took over as Convenor of Debating and managed to go to Cadets on a Friday afternoon. One of his initiatives to get more boys involved in debating was to organise debates against girls schools. There was no Catholic Secondary Schools Debating Association at that stage, so Peter craftily engineered debates against Brigidine, Randwick and Holy Cross, Woollahra. The real gems in the debating calendar were debates against Kincoppal convent at Elizabeth Bay and Rose Bay convent, which took place in the magnificent monastery building overlooking the harbour. Needless to say, there were many friendships forged at these debates. Waverley probably outdid everyone with the suppers, which were put on by a group of dedicated mothers every Friday night. At one point in his career when the Mothers' Club was being formed, Peter became a type of liaison officer for them. They organised the cleaning of the hall as

the College didn't have cleaners in those days. Nor were there gardeners or groundsman, just one person who spent the afternoon wandering around the yard after lunch clearing any rubbish.

During this time, Peter made a lot of good friends on staff. Some of the lay-staff resided in the Grange and there was a great feeling of camaraderie amongst them. It was also a time when Peter decided to undertake further study and enrolled in the three year Master of Arts course at Sydney University, with English as his major.



I'd made up my mind that if I was going to succeed in my career – and I should mention here that I really didn't expect to stay at Waverley College for my career at all – that after a certain time I would move on and seek promotional positions in other schools. So I decided that I'd better go back to university."

However, Peter was offered the opportunity of promotion within Waverley College when the Headmaster approached him and said that Brother Walsh had decided to give up either Head of English or Head of Year 12, and asked Peter if he would like to take on one of these roles.



I said well, yes I would very much prefer to do Head of English, to which I was told by the Headmaster, 'well, Brother Walsh would actually like to do that so you'd better do Head of Year 12.'"

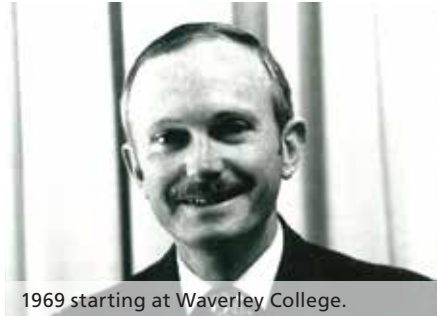
And so began a nine year stint for Peter as the Head of Year 12. The school faced some very difficult periods with what was then called muck-up days. These could be very harmful in many respects for a lot of people. Youthful exuberance and perhaps the sense of release from the discipline of the school meant that things were often soured at the end of the boys' senior year. Brother Kirwan and Peter decided to come up with strategies to combat this, and initiated the Year 12 farewell assembly. They created the idea of a circle of chairs around the quadrangle so that the boys would move from sitting in the main part of the quadrangle and sit instead in the circular driveway as a member of the Year 12 group. They coupled this with a unique fundraising initiative, called 'stretcher-thon', raising money for the Prince of Wales Children's Hospital.



So this rather weird parade of Year 12s left Waverley College carrying 'patients' on stretchers down Carrington Road to the hospital, all of them dressed in various guises as doctors and nurses."

At that stage, the Deputy Headmaster of the College was Brother Frank Farrell, who was in charge of Cadets and a distinguished teacher. He had been Peter's physics teacher for one year, although probably despaired of getting any good results from him. Subsequently, Peter did not take that subject in the Leaving Certificate. The two became good friends over the years, and Peter became the first lay-person to deliver a eulogy for one of the members of the Christian Brothers when he had the privilege to do so at Brother Farrell's funeral.

A high point of Peter's career was when Brother Farrell was made the Acting Headmaster for six months and Peter took on the role of acting Deputy Headmaster. They enjoyed organising school functions and working together as a small team. Following this, Peter

was made Assistant Deputy Headmaster, a job that consisted of organising substitute teachers each morning. This meant getting to the school very early, and being pre-computers, this was fraught with anxiety and pressure. Peter was also responsible on occasion for producing the school timetable.



The first time I took it on, it took me 4-5 weeks of holiday time just to put the thing together."

Another of Peter's roles was editor of the term magazine, the Waverlian. Content consisted of reports and written excerpts done by the boys themselves. However, as the years went on, it became more and more difficult to attract articles for it. The sad decision was made to cease publishing the Waverlian and simply have one annual each year called Waverley. Editing the Waverley annual also fell to Peter, again before the days of computers, so typically his bedroom at home became the production room, where he would type out content then laboriously cut and paste it together.

There was of course the additional role of training the boys in sport. For the majority of his time, Peter coached the 3rd XV rugby team.



I think the great enjoyment of coaching rugby is building of expertise and seeing the wonderful relationships that develop in a team. I'm a firm advocate of sport in schools – I think experiencing team sports makes an enormous difference to the lives of young people."



On Friday 26 October, 2018, a dinner was held to honour Mr Frost on his 50 years of distinguished service to Waverley College. It was a wonderful evening attended by a 220 strong crowd, reflecting on the many aspects of Peter's College life in the classroom, with cadets and as a member of the executive. His Excellency General the Honourable Sir Peter Cosgrove AK MC (Retd) attended with Lady Cosgrove and spoke glowingly about Peter's integrity, work ethic and calmness that he brings to situations.

Previous Headmasters that had worked with Peter were also present including Br Paul Oakley, Br Bob Wallace and Mr Ray Paxton, along with Peter's other classmate, Captain Peter Collins (former NSW Opposition Leader).

In 1993, after his time as Assistant Deputy Headmaster, Peter took a year's sabbatical of overseas study and travel. Brother Wallace wrote to Peter while he was away informing him that he had been appointed the Director of Administration, a new role at Waverley College.



A rather grandiose title – I was quite reluctant to take on the role because I wasn't an expert in computers, bursaries, financial management and so on."

But it was a role he found interesting and grew into, developing the necessary skills over time. He dealt with legal issues of the school, and was responsible for arranging the copyright of the school colours and emblems.



I owe a great deal of debt to Brother Wallace, who scared the wits out of me but at the same time offered me great opportunities to develop skills that I didn't think I necessarily had."

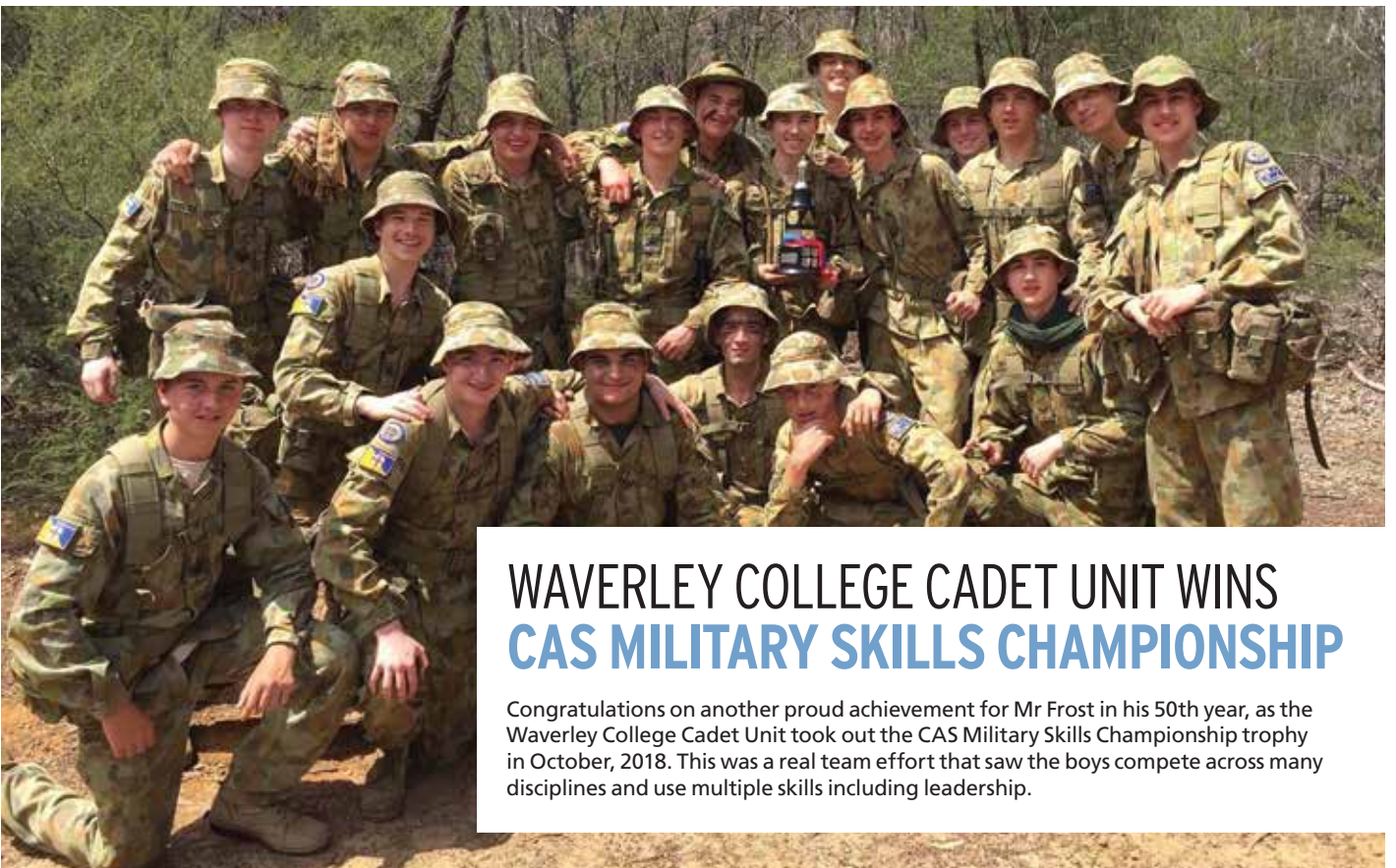
Peter had also returned to UNSW where he completed a Master of Educational Administration.

Cadets continue to be a major aspect of Peter's working life, and the list of accomplishments he and the Waverley Cadet Unit have achieved over the years is perhaps too extensive for this article. Needless to say, he has played a pivotal role in the educational experiences of many young Waverlians and ensuring the activities of the Cadets have been able to operate so effectively throughout many bureaucratic changes over the years.

One of the things Peter did upon graduating from the College in 1964 was to join the Old Boys' Union (OBU). The president at the time was Mick Salmon, who had been one of Peter's great school friends. He encouraged Peter to become a life member of the Union, and Peter served several years on the Council before serving as President from 1977–1979.



Organisations like the OBU are wonderful within the school framework as you meet such eminent people and are provided with numerous opportunities."

An excerpt from Tony's speech:



I remember my first day at Waverley. I'd just moved from an inner city boy's school where I'd been punched by a student, had a knife pulled on me by group of disgruntled students, threatened by a boy who a few years later would end up in Long Bay for murder – so I was excited to be at school like Waverley. A fellow teacher however took me aside and warned me how difficult the students could be; well it only took one lesson for me to walk into the staffroom and give him a clip behind the ear to remind him just how good he had it here.

In the space of a few days, I went from wanting to leave teaching to loving my work and looking forward to coming to work each day. What keeps someone in one place for so long? It's really simple; the Junior School is a truly special place with great people who create a family-like atmosphere. What you need to understand and keep in mind is that parents don't have to send their son to the Junior School. They make a determined decision to change schools to send him to Waverley. They want something special for their son – they want him challenged, they want him involved, they want a boy friendly structure and they want teachers who understand boys and boys' education.

Yes, it's busy and noisy but I'd like to believe we have created an environment where boys want to come to learn, to achieve their best, to learn about charity, empathy and inclusiveness. My hope has always been that every boy that comes to the Junior School strives to be the best person he can be and that the teachers inspire him as role models. I'm happy to walk away from the College at the end of the term knowing that I've had the real privilege of teaching over 4000 unique young men and I hope I've made a difference and had an impact in their lives."

FUTURE OF TRANSPORT CHALLENGE



Congratulations to Waverley College students **Will Gibson, Finn Anderson, Luke McLellan, Edward Sullivan and Patrick Hoggett** in Year 9 who worked collaboratively to submit a pitch for the NRMA Future of Transport Challenge.

These young entrepreneurs had a vision for the future to 'get more cars off the road in Sydney'. They believe that 'cars have a major impact on many issues relating to the environment including increased air pollution and greenhouse gases, as well as being the cause of major tragedies on our roads. This congestion can also cause stress, longer travel time and increased vehicular queueing'.

Their submission was 'a car share app that aims to reduce the amount of cars on the road in Sydney. This solution allows multiple people to travel to the same location together. This could be useful for adults going to work or students going to school'. Their proposed app 'Carlaborate' is designed to unite people.

Waverley College was announced as one of the top four finalists in this competition for the second year in a row, and invited to the Youth Eco Summit to present their pitch.



WORLD'S GREATEST SHAVE

In 2018, Waverley College once again supported the Leukaemia Foundation's World's Greatest Shave which helps find a cure for brain cancer. An outstanding proportion of students donated and many heads were shaved in support of the cause, raising just over \$14,000.

HUGO'S ROBOT 'CHRISTOPHER' ON THE TODAY SHOW

On 30 October, 2018, the *Today Show* presented an inspiring story on how Hugo Kulcsar is staying connected with his friends and class with an 'educational robot' while he continues his treatment for Leukaemia. When Hugo was first diagnosed in June this year, his Oncology Nurse, Donna Drew (a former Waverley parent), organised a robot for Hugo through a not-for-profit organisation 'Missing School.' The story focused on how Hugo uses his laptop from home, when he is not well enough to attend school, to connect to his robot, named 'Christopher', in the classroom. Hugo demonstrated how easy it was to move the robot around the classroom using specific keys on his laptop. It was wonderful to see Hugo's friends engaged in conversation with him and enjoy his company. The robot has enabled Hugo to continue his learning from home and participate in the daily lessons with his classmates.

Hugo's robot – 'Christopher' is named after the son of one of Missing School's founders. The real life Christopher is a two time Leukaemia survivor who is now 18 years old. In February, 2012, three Canberra mothers met to celebrate their children's recovery from long illnesses. They all expressed their concerns about the impact of those illnesses on their children's



friendships and schooling. From that meeting, Missing School was born and their goal was to explore ways of supporting children, families and teachers through very difficult times.

Hugo's Mum, Denai, expressed her gratitude by acknowledging how blessed she feels that Hugo has the robot as this opportunity is not given to every sick child. She can see how the robot has given Hugo wonderful support, encouragement and a positive state of mind during this very challenging time of his life.

WORLD YOUTH OLYMPICS

STUART SWINBURN

Stuart Swinburn was one of 15 boys and 15 girls who qualified to represent Australia at the Junior Pan Pacs Championships in Suva Fiji in August, 2018. The Pan Pacs Championships are held every two years, being a premier international swimming competition for both junior and open swimmers. The countries that compete at Pan Pacs are all countries associated with the Pacific Ocean including the strong swimming nations of the USA, Canada, Japan and Australia.

YOUTH OLYMPIC GAMES

BUENOS AIRES ARGENTINA

Stuart Swinburn was also selected in a small team of eight swimmers (four boys and four girls) to compete for Australia at Youth Olympics in Buenos Aires, 6–18 October, 2018.

The Youth Olympics are based on the same program as the Olympics, with 28 sports held in the summer games. Stuart was part of a larger Australian team who enjoyed the experience of living in a games village, mixing with athletes from different sports and different countries.

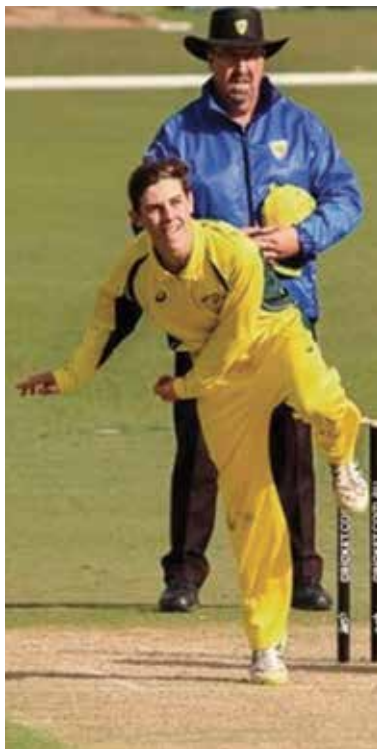

HELPING ROHINGYA REFUGEES IN BANGLADESH

PAUL DE LAUNAY OAM CLASS OF 1965

It is now 12 months since the start of the large Rohingya refugee influx into Bangladesh from neighbouring Myanmar. We have approximately 1.2 million Rohingya refugees living in Bangladesh in the largest refugee camp in the world. These people are being cared for by the Government of Bangladesh, assisted by United Nations and Non Government Organisations.

As UNHCR's Shelter focal point for the Camps at Nayapara, Chakmakul and Chaukali, I travel almost daily to the camps to continue the work of providing safe and dignified refugee housing. The 136.6 million USD budget for the shelter sector is currently 25% funded (IOM figures).

My team of national and international staff comprises engineers with expertise in camp planning, structural engineering, shelter design, geotechnical engineering, drone photography, GIS, mapping and AutoCAD. We locate and map camp sites, develop shelter and infrastructure layouts and design the buildings, roads and associated infrastructure. The follow up, of course is the implementation, monitoring, evaluation and reporting.

The seasonal weather cycle in this part of Bangladesh is monsoonal rain followed by cyclones. We are just at the end of the monsoon season and the cyclone season is approaching.

The monsoon season brings with it the risks of landslide and flooding. There are three camps south of Cox's Bazar and these are generally located on hilly land composed of sandy silt which can become unstable due to saturation during rain periods. We feared spontaneous landslides, which would cause heavy casualties, and worked tirelessly through the wet season, in ankle deep mud, moving 40,852 people from high risk areas. We have been successful so far.

The overcrowded conditions also contribute to health risks which are

exacerbated by the monsoon. Flooded pit latrines contaminate water sources causing diseases such as Cholera.

We are in the process of planning a new camp, Chaukali, to relocate vulnerable families from nearby Chakmakul. Access to Chaukali is over a river which only has a rough timber foot bridge. A new 50 metre steel bridge is currently being fabricated in Italy and is due to be installed in about 10 weeks.

The work continues as we move toward implementing improvements to make the camps safer as the future of these refugees remains uncertain.

SURF LIFESAVING AUSTRALIA HALL OF FAME ANDREW BOWDEN, BRONTE SLSC, NSW

ANDREW BOWDEN CLASS OF 2011



Andrew is a highly decorated surf lifesaver with a remarkable record as an elite athlete. A member of Bronte SLSC, Andrew has won 15 Individual Open Australian titles as a rescue swimmer. His distinguished representative career includes winning five gold medals at the World Titles with the Australian Lifesaving Team between 2008 – 2014. Andrew was the Australian Lifesaving Team Captain in 2003 that won the Be Ne (Orange) and German Cups, for the first time.

Andrew was the Head Coach and Team Member of the SLSNSW Team in 2014, 2015 and 2016, and a mentor for young athletes in the Australian Youth Lifesaving Team. He retired from National and International competition in 2016.

Andrew's contribution to bring the SLSA and RLSSA International Team into one consolidated Australian Life Saving Team is of major significance, including his individual efforts through holding joint membership with Bronte SLSC and the Hills District RLSS Club.

Andrew has also been a key player in the merging of the two National Pool Championships from 2018, which will have long term advantages for SLS membership. His patrol achievements include the Surf Lifesaving Meritorious Award with Bronze Insert in 2005 for a rescue at Bronte Beach in treacherous conditions.

EDUCATING THE FUTURE 2015 ALUMNI CONTINUE TO DO GOOD THROUGH THEIR CHARITY

ALESSANDRO PIOVANO & ADAM HEGEDUS CLASS OF 2015



Waverley College has had some illustrious alumni in the past and the story of these 2015 Waverley College graduates is in that category. Adam Hegedus and Alessandro Piovano Class of 2015 (Dux and 3rd Dux of that year respectively) set off to walk the whole of 758 kms to their schoolies in Byron Bay

with the intention of raising funds to build a school in Timor Leste. That initiative was called 'Schoolies for Schooling' and they managed to raise over \$19,000. They brought out the empathy of other teenagers and raised awareness of the plight of education for those less fortunate. They were also nominated for 2017 Young Australians of the Year.

Alessandro and Adam carried that pledge to build a school further and went on to create a charity called Educating The Future (ETF) whose sole aim is to improve access to education for children, focusing on our close neighbours – Timor Leste. Through consultation with local Timorese groups and government aides, the district of Ermera was picked as the most in need of a preschool and the village of Motahare as the best place to build it in – as it is a hub for five surrounding villages, with a total of 95 children in the vicinity. The preschool will cater to 65 children on a rotational basis.

Using a combination of locally sourced expertise, construction methods and labour, the team of two builders and a rotating group of five volunteers

erected the structure in less than five months. The project furthered its impact through the use of locally sourced materials in Ermera and the nation's capital, Dili.

After a two year process of community involvement and collaboration, Educating The Future achieved its founding goal in 2017 and the preschool was finished. The official handover ceremony to the community was attended by both Adam and Alessandro, village elders and government officials. The Timorese Ministry of Education, also committed to providing an experienced teacher for the school, teaching the Timorese curriculum.

Alessandro Piovano and Adam Hegedus continue to work as Chairmen for the charity even though they both have busy university schedules. They have also stirred up other students with the same quest of doing good and giving back, and now have a team of over 20 students working together towards their next goal, building further preschools in Timor, through the collaboration of the Timorese people and government.

The drive for all this started with the Waverley College Immersion programme to Timor Leste that these Waverley alumni attended in 2014. It brought to light the hardships that others face in order to gain an education that here in Australia we take for granted. Alessandro Piovano and Adam Hegedus are proof what a good education can do – build a better and brighter future, not just for themselves but also for a country not that far away from our own.

1969 ALUMNI MAKING A DIFFERENCE IN EDUCATION

Dr Tony Bracken is not only an Old Boy of the College, but also a past teacher. He has progressed up through the ranks of Education and was awarded a fellowship recently at the Sydney Hilton.

Tony Bracken's current role is Assistant Director School Improvement at the Catholic Schools Office Broken Bay Diocese, NSW. In 2016 he received a Leadership Award for his leadership role in Leading Learning in Broken Bay.

Prior professional experience includes a senior role at the Catholic Education Office in Parramatta and beforehand a secondary principal.

Tony has continued to maintain academic contact with the university sector, including sessional lecturing role in the Masters of Educational Leadership at Australian Catholic University and past or current advisory roles with two other universities. For two years he has contributed to the National Policy Committee of the Australian College of Educators and coordinated the national response to the Chief Scientist's national report on a science nation.

BRIAN FRANCIS KENNY CLASS OF 1955



On Friday 27 July, 2018, the sudden death of Mr Brian Kenny brought shock and great sadness to his family, friends and the community of Nowra; the ripple effects of his passing causing as much sadness in the community of Waverley and beyond.

The Kenny name is a famous one with a long connection to Waverley College. The connection going right back to the early days of the college where some of the property owned by the Kenny family became part of the fabric of the college itself.

Brian Kenny was the son of Mr Edward 'Ted' Kenny. Ted had been a successful student at the College and a competent man on the land. The family was based in Griffith and had success in property management and also conducted a stock agency. Ted was the younger brother of Thomas James Bede Kenny VC. Bede had been awarded the Victoria Cross for an act of exceeding valour in single-handedly capturing a German machine gun post which had already been responsible for killing and wounding of a large number of Australian soldiers and had endangered a great many more. Bede's actions were selfless and brave in the extreme.

Both men had a great love and respect for their Alma Mater and its Patroness. This saw them both show their devotion each year at the May Procession in Honour of Our Lady; Bede assisting in carrying the statue of Our Lady and Ted leading the ceremonies carrying the Processional Cross, until their participation ended, only by their deaths. Their combined efforts amounting to over 70 years of active participation.

The Legacy of both men became embodied in Ted's son, Brian Kenny. Like his father and uncle, Brian had a successful and enjoyable time as a student at Waverley. He supported its many causes and was involved in as many of its activities as possible. Upon leaving the college, Brian had returned to Griffith to work in the family business. He also spent a period of time working for The NSW Lands Department. He was a traveller and a land valuer. He served as a stock agent and became a well respected member of the Nowra community when he moved there with his wife, Mary, and the family. His own sons, Paul (Class of 1971) and Mark (Class of 1979) also attended the College. His great nephew Bede Burke attended the College, leaving in the Class of 2013.

Brian loved his school and always made the effort to attend the events that attracted the most Old Boys: The May Procession and the 'Back to Waverley' days. Brian has been described as a larger than life character with time for everyone he ever met. If he didn't have time, he made time. He devoted many hours to community groups, including St Vincent De Paul and Rotary. His sense of humour and love of dessert was legendary as was his interest in everything historical. It was his love of history that saw him embark on a pilgrimage to Europe taking a tour of the Western Front Battlefields of The First World War. It was his goal to visit the village of Hermies in France, where his 'Uncle Bede' had fought the action that resulted in the awarding of the VC. Brian and his party arrived at the spot on 9 April, 2017, the 100th Anniversary of the event. After Brian had returned from the trip, he spoke about his experience. "The farmer who owned the property happened to be nearby and seeing our small group approached us to see what we were doing. When he found out that a Victoria Cross had been received on his land, he was so proud! Even more so that it was an Australian!" he said.

Brian was farewelled with a traditional Roman Catholic Requiem Mass on Friday, 3 August, concelebrated by four priests in his parish church of St Michael's, Nowra. The funeral was planned meticulously by Brian himself 'just in case'. The church was filled and overflowing with many people that he had affected by his life. His family and friends were moved by the words spoken by his sons and his colleagues in the eulogies. His old school paid its own tribute with the presence of a Guard of Honour supplied by the Waverley College Cadet Unit. Brian's life was summed up with the inclusion of the Old Testament reading from the Book of Mica; 6:8.

'He has shown you, O mortal, what is good. And what does the Lord require of you? To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God.'

WAVERLEY COLLEGE CADET CATAFALQUE PARTY

In a moving and generous gesture, Waverley College provided a Cadet Catafalque Party for Brian's funeral procession from the church. It was appreciated by everyone, but Brian would have been appreciated this the most. He was very proud of his Waverlian roots, especially his service in the cadet unit. The cadets did an excellent job.

AND THE HISTORIC FAMILY CONNECTION... THOMAS JAMES BEDE KENNY VC



Thomas James Bede Kenny (always known as 'Bede') was the son of a nursing sister. Registering his occupation as a chemist when he enlisted aged 19, Bede was assigned to 13th Reinforcements 2nd Battalion, which left Australia on 20 December, 1915. Arriving in Egypt in February, he finally reached France in August 1916 where he served with 1st Division on the Somme for the remainder of the year.

In April 1917, he took part in one of the battles of the 'outlying villages', following the German withdrawal to the Hindenburg Line in the early spring of 1917. Bede's action took place near the village of Hermies. Bede was awarded the Victoria Cross for 'conspicuous gallantry' and bravery and returned home to Australia in October 1918 to a hero's welcome.

ANTHONY JOHN SMITH CLASS OF 1945**AN EXCERPT FROM ROBERT SMITH'S EULOGY**

"There is a study from the US that may not be applicable here in Australia, but as far as they can tell from previous records, in the end, 100% of people die of something. These statistics caught up with Dad.

Dad was born in 1928 in Bondi. Different times. Just ahead of the great depression and WW2. Pre smartphone, pre PC, pre TV and in a world of radios with valves.

The Harbour Bridge was only half finished.

The first talkie 'Jazz singer' (Black and white of course) came out late 1928.

Dad was taught Latin in school and went to Latin Mass. It was a different Bondi. Trams. No free-trade smashed avocado on gluten free sourdough toast. Meat pie or sausage roll, bread and dripping (extra virgin lard). Beer can in two types – new or old. The height of sophistication was Dad's tippie, crown lager.

Yet early on and throughout his life, there were common threads – sport, sea, church, family. Some of these reflected in the objects on the coffin, his slide rule, a rugby jersey, his swimming goggles, a crossword, and the photo of the family as young children at Clovelly beach.

His early life at Bondi was as one of the six children to Carl Smith and Rose Mackin (who's apple dumplings he's always pined for).

There was also his cousin, Tom Lonergan, larger than life and rarest of things, a lovable lawyer. His wife Jo and family are here today, as well as Len, Molly and their kids, Denise and Michael.

School was at St Anne's and St Charles, then Waverley College where his dad went before him, along with his brothers, and brothers-in-law Jim, and Jack, who went on to become a Christian brother. Us four boys went, and he got to see his two grandsons go as well. The May Procession, school sports, rugby, and eventually football (soccer) and cricket, were all the fabric of his life. He did Engineering at Sydney Uni (where he met lifelong pals including Max Weston of Smith and Weston' fame.)

As kids, he would go off to work at STC and Phillips and we did not know what he did, only that it was something to do with phones.

That all changed when he went to AGL, a job he got with the help of our acolyte Garry O'Mealy. There, we still did not know what he did but it was something to do with gas.

Work and engineering was an important part of his life. He still remembered the day as a student when Bell laboratories announced the first transistor in the late, 1940s, and he was one of the few people in Australia who realised how earth changing it was. Even after he retired he loved a gadget, loved to tinker and was amongst his happiest when he had a project to work on. As he got older, (from our point of view) the longer, the slower and the less complex the project, the better.

And here we pause, after speaking of his early life at 76 Warners Avenue, because Dad's life had three clear phases.

Before Mary.

With Mary.

After Mary.

There was no doubt which part he valued most. Mary, mum, was the love of his life. He thought about her and missed her every day of the 31 years they were apart. So today is another goodbye – to Dad but also to Mum again and the memory of what they shared together.

Dad was a good man – he had a good life.

You are here today testament to that.

We got to see his life

We get to share his life

And today, for that, we say thank you and goodbye."

EDMUND CAMPION 'TED' PEARCE CLASS OF 1956

Ted completed the Leaving Certificate in 1956 and had been a drummer in the Cadet Unit band. Always interested in electronics, he became engaged in the then newly emerging realm of television, and subsequently operated a mobile repair van advertised as 'Ted's Radio and TV Service'. Receiving a late vocation to the religious life, he entered the Christian Brothers' juniorate in 1963. He taught at St Gabriel's for the Deaf at Castle Hill, where he learnt sign language. He was in charge of Form 1 at Waverley in 1968, then Manly, and finally St Edmund's College in Canberra, teaching maths and science. His technical expertise included installation of an acoustic system for the sports oval. In 1983, he sought leave from the Brothers and thereafter taught as a lay person. Later voted the school's most popular teacher and receiving a standing ovation on his last day. He remained in Canberra until his death on 21 July, 2010.

KEVIN JOSEPH KEARNEY CLASS OF 1954

Kevin Kearney's family resided in Bondi for over 40 years, as did Kevin throughout his youth. Kevin attended Waverley College, Our Lady of the Mount, from 1942 until 1954 which accounted for his entire primary and high school career. During this time, he and his tennis partner, John Brennan, managed to win quite a few doubles tournaments together. John remembers Kevin as "a gentle giant, always a sportsman and he so often carried the day with his big serve and court skills." Like John, Kevin was a member of the Old Boys Class of 1954, attending as many reunions over the years as he could given his work commitments, yet he and John continued their schoolboy friendship until Kevin's death – a friendship of over 65 years.

On leaving school he travelled throughout Australia until he finally decided to return to Sydney and in 1961 – five years after the beginning of television in Australia – he joined the Australian Broadcasting Commission (ABC-TV), Gore Hill.

Kevin has over 100 Sound Department credits for feature films, telemovies, television series, documentaries, music clips and short films (listed on IMDb), plus six CDs and one radio play.

In his 35-year career in the media industries, Kevin worked on over 3,000 commercials, produced two feature films, three short films (*Jeremy and Teapot* awarded Best Film at the Tucson Film & Video Festival, USA. and *AND / OR = ONE* nominated for Best Film at the same Festival), edited two productions and completed 56 digital archival DVDs from 1996 to 2014. He was also the producer / director of *Sights & Sounds Of '69* featuring Tully & John Sangster – the first modern music and light show to be held at the Sydney Town Hall, Australia.

Kevin loved and enjoyed a long and exciting professional career in media from 1961 until he retired in 1996 following his production of the feature film – *Jindalee Lady*. Nominated for Best Film – East West Award at the Hawaii International Film Festival, it is the first feature film to be directed by a First Nations director, Brian Syron, and the first feature film to have the music composed and directed by a First Nation musician, Bart Willoughby.

Kevin's death was extremely fast five days in all, as the cancer had taken over his windpipe and there was no knowledge by anyone that this had happened until the final scan. Kevin chose to donate his body to the University of Queensland – UQ Body Donor Program where his body will contribute to the advancement of teaching, training, scientific studies and research.

A final book, dedicated to Kevin's only son Andrew Taylor ACS, is a selection of Kevin's writing – *Spinning Gently Out of Time or Life To The Endgame*. It has been published as a tribute to his contribution to the Australian film and television industry, where he spent his working life, and contains letters and photographs from his workmates and friends along with his final thoughts from Brisbane Palliative Care three days before he left us.

JUSTIN 'WAL' CRANNEY ADMIRED TEACHER, RUGBY AND ATHLETICS COACH AT WAVERLEY COLLEGE 1966-2006



Justin Cranney, Wal as we knew him, was a notable Biology Teacher, Rugby and Athletics Coach for so many years at Our Lady's Mount Waverley. As an Old Waverlian myself, I remember Wal well, as a fellow member of staff and coach. There were significantly memorable occasions associated with Wal's successful coaching career, such as Paul Rynehart's spectacular winning of the Cardinal's Cup at the St Pat's Day Sports, in the time of Cardinal Gilroy when I was MIC of Athletics. As a contemporary fellow Resident Master living in The

Grange, I knew Wal personally very well and can attest to his cheerful manner together with his intense, conscientious, consistent, successful coaching and teaching. As a former well regarded Marist we say ... Farewell Wal, our prayers go with you and Requiescat in Pace – Your race is run so very well.

AN EXCERPT FROM JUSTIN CRANNEY'S EULOGY WRITTEN BY HIS NEPHEW

When it came time to write this eulogy, I was in two minds. The first was that Uncle Justin or Wal to some of you, wouldn't want the fuss. The second was that he touched all of our lives over the last 87 years and we needed to acknowledge this very humble, private and independent man.

He attended St Patricks Primary School and Marist Brother High school, both in Parramatta. He was an altar boy at St Patrick's Church and received all of his sacraments there. He still had all of his sacramental certificates, his First Holy Communion Certificate, being 80 years old. This is testament to how important his faith has been throughout his life. At school he was a good student and gifted athlete. He was captain and five-eight of his football team. The 1947 yearbook describes him as an outstanding player. He was fast, a good handler and could side step on either foot. He scored 10 tries, kicked 42 goals and scored 114 points during the season. He proved himself an excellent captain and was the inspiration of the team. He still had the Best and Fairest Trophy that he was awarded for that season, clearly something he was very proud of. He also played cricket, swam and was part of the athletics team. His school friends have remained lifelong friends, and our family appreciates their condolences this past week.

He left Parramatta Marist at the end of 1947 to enter the Marist Brothers Novitiate at Mittagong, to begin his training as a Marist brother, and was professed Brother Walter. He continued his love of sports and played in the Marist Brothers cricket and football teams. He commenced his teaching life as a primary school teacher and then a secondary science teacher. He taught at St Anne's Bondi Beach, Mosman, Darlinghurst, Ashgrove, Innisfail and St Joseph's Hunters Hill. During this time, he set science paper for the Marist Brothers Schools and was a sports master and a discipline master. An ex-student from St Anne's told me that Uncle Justin changed his life, the inspiration and leadership allowed him to excel in Wal's classes. The impact that Uncle Justin had on him is still appreciated some 50 years later. At the end of 1965 Uncle Justin left the Brothers and commenced a position as a lay science teacher and boarding master at Waverley College.

In 1970, he purchased his unit in Bondi and became part of the Bondi community joining the many sporting clubs. He became a Rugby League referee and a Justice of the Peace. He was a regular at the Beach Road Hotel where he would have a drink and his evening meal, and look forward to a chat, as he would say "with the kids that he had taught". One day I asked him about the kids and the realisation came that perhaps they were kids no longer.

For health reasons in later life he began a daily walking routine. He was very disciplined and walked every day. He became a familiar sight to the locals, the friendly older gentleman on the walking frame. He always took the time to have a coffee at the coffee shop and say hello to those he

passed, especially the children. I think he became a bit of a local identity on those walks.

During his 40 years at Waverley College, he was a senior biology teacher, a science master, a religion teacher – he always taught the leaving Year 10 Religion class, because he thought he could make a difference to their faith journey. He successfully coached the 2nd 15 Rugby team and was extremely successful coaching the Athletics team. The team had won the Combined Athletics Championship 12 times under his guidance. I am told that he was outstanding, developing the basics on which greater success could be built. I am also told that both in the classroom and as a coach, he was firm and always fair. His manner earned him the respect of his students. It is remembered that one of his favourite sayings was "If you want to be a clown, join the circus".

At the end of 1996 a virus rendered him partially deaf and made teaching difficult. With the boys' best interests at heart he gave up classroom teaching. At the commencement of 1997, he took up a position on the College ancillary staff as the College archivist. He finally retired from Waverley on 5 May, 2006.

Waverley was more than a job to Uncle Justin, it was his home, and the boys during those 40 years were his family. He loved coaching the rugby, athletics and tennis teams. He said that building a relationship with the boys on the sporting field often brought out the very best of them in the classroom as young men.

In his personal papers, he had kept many thank you notes from his students received over the years... *Thank you for all the extra time you spent with the opens and under 17s. All through the holidays, rain or shine you were there. Also for the little things that only a great coach like you can give.* There was also a note included in an old pay slip. *"The extra this week is a small bonus for your much-appreciated loyalty and magnificent work last year."*

JOHN GINMAN CLASS OF 1953

My name is Nick Ginman, I left Waverley in 1964, I wanted to inform you that my oldest brother, John Ginman passed away on the 18 June, 2017. John attended Waverley between 1945 and 1953 and he was always in the top 10 of his year. In his later years, he resided in Canberra where he had worked for the Federal Government. He is survived by his two sons and three grandsons.

BRIAN FRANCIS DONOHOE CLASS OF 1956

Brian Francis Donohoe passed away in Gosford Hospital on Friday, 5 October 2018 following a short illness. Brian was born on 26 April 1943 in the War Memorial Hospital, Waverley, a stones throw away from Waverley College.

Brian was the fourth child of the seven children of Hugh Donohoe, a publisher, and the former Miss Kathleen Clare Egan. Brian was their third son. Dad, Hugh, was a Waverley Old Boy (Class of 1929). Clare, as she was known, was the daughter of the local real estate agent, Edward James 'Jim' Egan and the former Miss Mary Emily Goodin. Jim and Mary Egan were prominent benefactors towards the College during its formative years. The Conlon Gates was among examples of their generosity.

Brian, a great beer lover, was a direct descendant of Australia's first beer brewer, James Squire. Brian attended the 'James Squire' Brewery with host, Senior brewer, Chuck Hahn.

Cyril Egan, Brian's uncle, was twice Captain of the College (1913–1914). Cyril was the Water Board's Supervising Engineer on the Warragamba Dam Project. Frank Egan, another uncle (Waverley Class of 1919) played first grade Rugby League for Easts, Brian's beloved team. Brian held on to life to cheer Easts to victory, only hours before his passing.

Brian commenced school at St Clare's College and moved to Waverley

in Second Class. Brian progressed to Fifth Year but left the College mid-year transferring to St Mary's Cathedral School where he sat his Leaving Certificate.

Choosing a Public Service career, Brian joined the Treasury Department. In later years, he transferred to the Builders Licensing Board where he achieved management appointments. He was awarded the Public Service Medallion at the time of his retirement after forty years of service.

In 1949, Brian was among many Waverley residents who fell ill to polio. Brian spent some six months in hospital undergoing treatment. He made an almost full recovery, going on to excel in football, swimming and cricket. After his school days, he participated in competitive basketball. He also loved bodysurfing.

Brian was active in Waverley Catholic Youth Organisation. There he met his future spouse, Janice Murphy. They married in Mary Immaculate Church, Waverley, on 4 September, 1965. They were blessed with three children, Bill, Julie and Kim, and five grandchildren, Liam, Samuel and Benjamin Paynter and Anthony and James Donohoe.

Brian was very active in coaching, organising and supporting youth sports. More particularly, he was for many years Secretary of the Forestville Ferrets Juniors Rugby League as well as holding other official positions in the Club.
