



Waverley College launches blended learning

Two hundred Year 7 Waverley College students were the first to receive Macbook Air laptops in March when the College launched its innovative blended learning program known as *Waverley iLearn*.

Waverley College Headmaster Mr Ray Paxton said all Waverley College students from years 5 to 12 would be issued with laptops by 2014.

The launch followed an extensive year-long training program for Waverley's teaching staff and the appointment of the College's new Director of Learning Innovation, Mr Westley Field.

An acknowledged expert, Mr Field came to Waverley College from MLC Burwood where he was responsible for implementation of a highly successful blended learning program for the past seven years.





"The laptop initiative is aimed at increasing our students' engagement in their learning," Mr Paxton said.

"Research by the US Department of Education has shown that blended learning – combining online and face-to-face techniques – significantly improves academic performance and discipline in the classroom compared to traditional face-to-face teaching."

At the launch event, excited Year 7 students and their parents were briefed on use and care of their new laptops as well as cyber safety and ergonomics.

"Waverley iLearn introduces a blended learning environment which places equal value on both strong teacher/student relationships and online learning with the appropriate tools," said Mr Paxton.

"Our aim is to enhance the learning experience for our students, with well supported, customized, safe and secure technology.

"This technology is the future for our students in both their working and personal lives," Mr Paxton said.






From the Headmaster

New learning techniques would include online access to notes and learning materials, online collaboration during class, podcasting, blogs and wikis.

"Blended learning allows students access to their teacher's resources any time, anywhere, to participate, communicate and revise'" said Mr Paxton.

"Classroom collaboration can now be global: Waverley College has already established collaborative relationships with a number of interstate and overseas schools which are part of a new iLearning Consortium," he said.

The College's investment in blended learning has included installation of new network facilities and provision of wifi throughout the campus. School lockers were fitted with secure



Mr Paxton said the introduction of blended learning was part of a strategy to consolidate and build on the College's strong record of academic achievement.

"Waverley is proudly non-selective and yet achieves a place among the top 25% of the State's schools with eighty per cent of our graduates attending university," said Mr Paxton.

"This is achieved by retaining outstanding staff with a focus on the needs of each individual student in our care."

Academic Award Speech from Luke Saad ATAR 98.35

Good Evening

Mr. Paxton, teachers, parents, distinguished guests and current students of Waverley College. I graduated from Waverley College in 2011 with an ATAR of 98.35. In 2012 have enrolled in mining engineering at the UNSW as a fulltime student.

Tonight I have been asked to talk to you about my experiences at Waverley College in relation to how I approached my final year at Waverley as well as pass on any advice to current students as they pursue success

To the students of Waverley College today you stand here tonight because you have succeeded in your chosen fields of study, you are the brightest minds this College has to offer and are the future of this College. The school will look to you for guidance and growth and one day you will stand where I stand tonight sharing your experiences from your time at Waverley College

Tonight I issue a challenge to the students to take responsibility for their own education and futures, if you fail at times don't blame your teachers, your parents, your school or your peers, blame yourself. I challenge you to succeed because you want to, because you want to rise above those around you, because you want to be known and remembered and better than everybody else, not because your parents or teachers or school want you to.

Success comes from belief in yourself and a desire to accomplish what others cannot, in life people will tell you that you will fail, or that you're not good enough, people will tell you that you are wrong; these are the people who have failed in their own lives. Trust in yourself, nobody knows you better than yourself.

As obvious as it sounds first and foremost in order to succeed you must first try. Many people do not try because they fear that they are inadequate and will fail, they fear what others will think and say about them. Don't let anybody tell you what you can and can't do, or that your dreams are impossible, never lose sight of your dreams because these are what define you as human beings Success comes from hard work, there's no shortcut to success no matter how naturally talented you are. I see talent as a head start in life, but it's not how you start, it's how you finish. The HSC is designed to reward those who put in the hours. When you're not putting in the work, when you're playing games, going to parties, watching TV, etc. there is always someone out there working hard, improving themselves, getting ahead of you.

At the end of the day remember what is important in life... your family, your friends, your community, your beliefs. Do not lose sight of those who have given their time and made sacrifices for you because without them you would not be here today

For those currently undertaking the HSC your final year at school is the most important year of your lives up to date, not because it determines your future, but because it takes you one step closer to achieving your dreams .

I would like to conclude with two quotes. Firstly I quote Lance Armstrong:

"Pain is temporary. It may last a minute, or an hour, or a day, or a year, but eventually it will subside and something else will take its place. If I quit, however, it lasts forever."

Secondly I quote Marianne Williamson: "Our deepest fear is not that we are inadequate. Our deepest fear is that we are powerful beyond measure."

Academic Mentoring Program Begins for Year 12

Two of the biggest effects on improving student learning outcomes are:

- Providing feedback to students regularly;
- 2. Developing teacher-student relationships.

One way we will do this in 2012 in an ongoing and consistent manner is for members of the College Executive and Heads of Department and Senior Yearmasters to meet with all students in Year 12 once each term to discuss their academic progress. Each student in Year 12 will have a mentor they meet with for a lesson to sit and discuss one on one or in a small group such questions as:

Questions from Academic Mentor

- What subjects were you pleased with in your last report. Why?
- 2. What subjects were you disappointed with? Discuss reasons.
- 3. What strategies can you put into place to improve your subjects?
- 4. What goals would you like to set yourself for the next term?
- 5. Tell me about your study habits- good chance to check if they are organised, completing homework etc. Perhaps even ask for their college diary to see if they are mapping assessment tasks or bring some study notes with them to interview.

1:1 MacBook Learning Program Launch for Year 7

2012 saw the beginning of 1:1 learning at Waverley. Waverley is calling this it's iLearn program to distinguish the unique features of it and to make all in the Waverley community understand



what this exciting program is all about.

What is iLearn?

iLearn stands for what we call 21st Learning at Waverley. It is the world we live in. The world of the iphone, ipads, macbook, chat, SMS, increasing social networking media that connects our world. It's all about Innovative Learning programs at Waverley and providing students with information in their hands so they can engage with their world. And we know just like the baby in the photo learning starts early.

The 3 C's for 21st century Learning

At the core of the world of the 21st Century learner are the 3 Cs: The Student as Collaborator in a team to produce and Create new information to share within a Community of learners. At Waverley this may be a History student who is studying the Vietnam War and travels to Canberra to visit and film his experiences of the National War Memorial. He is challenged in a group to make a 10 min documentary of Australia's involvement in the Vietnam War and upload this to the College Learning Portal, Haiku, to be viewed by a panel of judges in the National History Competition, or to be shared by parents, teachers and students and a presentation night at the school.

Challenge Based Learning

iLearn and the 1:1 learning program is focused on tomorrow and moving forward. At Waverley we want to Develop critical thinking skills in our students required for today's workforce. We want boys to be challenged in their learning where they constantly reflect and think about how they best learn. We want to provide an environment where boys can collaborate on projects and share their learning and ideas with students both at Waverley and with online communities across the world. We have five broad aims for our students that iLearn will drive:

- 1. Students reflecting on their learning and understanding how they learn;
- 2. Students collaborating with other students in networks at Waverley and online;
- 3. Students developing critical thinking skills in how they learn;
- 4. Students working in teams to simulate real world projects that challenges their thinking and displays their problem solving skills;
- Students developing as Independent learners within a framework of blending learning environment, where some time is spent on face to face instruction in class and other time spend spent researching and learning independently online.

Using Research in Learning

The 1:1 iLearn program is based on a lot of research that works. We are using research from Apple to look at a Challenge Based Learning Framework for Year 7. We want boys to be challenged to think about their world to ask essential questions. We want them to have big ideas and work in teams to produce solutions to their questions now and into the future. 2012 marks the start of exciting times for learning at Waverley for teachers, students and parents.






College Year Books (Annuals) Go Digital

BROTHER PAUL LEARY 1943-2011

Gifted educator a charitable dynamo

he teacher and principal Brother Paul Leary got things done at his schools, no matter what the cost. Once he was heard to exclaim to a stunned electrical contractor: "Well, you'd better give me a good price – I'm working stack-ing shelves in Coles to pay for all this!"

ing sneives in Coles to pay just the all this!" He always left his appointments in better condition than when he arrived – even going to Papua New Guinea for a time to help clean up a school after a volcanic eruption. He gave his work his all and he gave his life to education. Paul Learywas born on December 19, 1943, one of the sons of Vincent Leary and his wife, Betty (nee Fry), and grew up in the Strathfield area. His association with the Christian Brothers began when he was

tian Brothers began when he was a student at St Patrick's College Strathfield then he joined the brothers in his late teens after working briefly in a bank. He started his teaching career

as a commerce/geography teacher at St Joseph's Too-woomba (1966) and went on to St Leo's Waitara (where he taught

a young Mel Gibson), then St Patrick's Strathfield. His first senior executive appointment was as assistant principal at St Edmund's Can-berta in 1979, followed by two years as principal at St Paul's in Kempsey. In 1994 empsey. In 1984 he started 10 years as

Kempsey.

In 1984 he started 10 years as principal of St Patrick's Sutherland, where he oversaw the change of the school to coeducation. He gained fame there for constructing a new building before the Catholic Schools Office gave its approval—as the official sat in Brother Paul's office discussing the proposal, Brother Paul cut the conversation short by stating foudly: "You know that building were planning? Well, you're sitting in it now."

In 1995, Brother Paul arrived as a ball of energy at St Pius X College Chatswood. He always spoke basso profundo.

He projected a loud, deep voice from his barred chest and could command respect from

could command respect from any audience, and rarely needed a sound system if he wanted to

make a point. In difficult moments he liked to use the most robust of language. His favourite imprecation was "feck" and the general rule

He also had great compassion. One member of his staff was disaught about his five-year-old daughter's serious illness. On bearing of it. Brother Paul

spread his arms wide, leant back
and loudly exclaimed: "Well, you qualify for three months leave to help her - and when that's done

Such stories followed Brother
Paul throughout his career.
He helped many, many people, and frightened hell out of
others. But such emotional bonesty had its personal cost.
The last thing he took care of
was his own wellbeing. When
asked what he wanted for dinner
he would loudly exclaim, "Anything as long as it's not green!"
He saw out his working life as
principal of Waverley College
from 2004 to 2009 then lived in
community at Gerringong
before his final move to Petrh,
where he was involved in several
projects and died suddenly in
his sleep.

There was nowhere in the world he ever went where he did not bump into someone who knew him.

Wally had the rare ability of making everyone feel special, and, he did it every day of his life

Wally was a tireless charity worker at our schools, Waverley College and St Vincent's college; he was instrumental in fund raising for the building of their pools.

He was also involved in;

- North Bondi Surf Club
- * Woollahra Golf Club, amongst others.

One of his proudest moments was the realisation of a 5 year project by him to acknowledge the work of Australian Catholic priest POW's in Changi Prison during WW2.
