

From the Headmaster

As 2012 draws to a close I take great pride in communicating to our community the exciting plans contained in our new Strategic Road Map for 2013 and 2014.

This detailed plan will be the driver for a focus on quality and excellence in everything we do here at Waverley College in the coming two years.

Highlights of our planning include the development of a refreshed visual identity for the College which will maintain our traditional crest but will see a fresh new 'look' for our publications, signage, website and communications. This new look will express the refreshed optimism and excitement for the future that is being generated at the College right now.

In the new year we also plan to employ a Development Officer whose role will be to establish a new Alumni and fundraising program. The College has a large and well-connected network of Old Boys and families and it is important that we work at maintaining their strong links with the College for the benefit of all.

The new Strategic Road Map also details the early stages of a major program of capital works which will transform the 'Our Lady's Mount' campus. The first stage of this will be the construction of a dynamic TAS Precinct on the site of what is currently a basketball court fronting Birrell Street. This will include two levels of flexible teaching space with facilities for teaching technology subjects



In the longer term the current Gymnasium will be modified to provide, when required, theatre-style seating for the entire school. The Conlon Building - the original school building of the Christian Brothers - will also eventually be transformed into a centrally located, state-of-the-art Library and Learning Resource Centre.

For these major and long term goals the College will ultimately require the financial support not just of its current community but of all who have benefitted from a Waverley College education over the years.



The first steps for this transformation are now underway: Over the Christmas break the College Library will move from its long-term location at the top of the East Wing to occupy the existing College Hall. This important move will place our information resource centre at the heart of the College and easily accessible to all students. The eastern side of the Hall will be opened up, with large windows onto the courtyard. It's beautiful location in the gardens of the Airmount Quadrangle and overlooking the Pacific Ocean will provide students with a pleasant and inviting location for study and research.

Christmas will also see the upgrading of the Administration Building elevator undertaken. The elevator will be extended so that it opens to the roof of the Administrative wing, allowing us to take better advantage of this space, with its spectacular views, for teaching purposes and functions.

But things won't just be changing on the outside.

Our 110th birthday year will see every student in the senior school issued with a Macbook Air computer. Trials with Years 7 and 10 during 2012 have been highly successful. In 2012 the College has invested major resources into training staff to deliver blended learning in our classrooms and also to ensure that our IT infrastructure is ready. Next year the entire student community will benefit from the improvement in engagement, classroom discipline and, ultimately, quality of learning that the blended approach can deliver.


Also in pursuit of excellence, in 2012 the College scholarship program was expanded and refined. The program now includes academic scholarships, Edmund Rice Scholarships for students whose families are experiencing financial hardship, and support for students who demonstrate excellence in sport, the arts or other pursuits.

A further initiative for 2013 will be a review of the College's Pastoral Care Model which will ensure that our standard of individualised care for each student is of the highest standard.

All of these initiatives feed into our vision to 'liberate the potential in every learner' and our pursuit of teaching excellence.

Waverley College Archives: a new home and a new project



Waverley College Archives has a new home! After nearly 20 years in Froebel House, the archives office and a small percentage of the collection has relocated to newly-refurbished offices on the second floor of the main admin building on Birrell Street.

This move places the archives – physically as well as administratively - within the Headmaster's Directorate, which also includes the development office, marketing and enrolments. This opens up all sorts of

possibilities for collaboration as well as increasing the visibility (and therefore use) of the archives.



Being located within the main building also makes it easier for staff, students (past and present) and parents to visit the archives. The photographic collection – such that it is – and all printed materials are now in the Birrell St office. The archives is open on Thursday and Fridays during term time. 
A major project has been launched this year: Waverley College will publish a commemorative book to honour

our ex-students who served and died in the Great War. We anticipate launching the finished work in May 2014 in the lead up to the 100^{th} anniversary of the outbreak of World War One.

Seventeen Waverley boys gave their lives between 1914-1918; a further 131 served, making a total of 148. This included 18 foundation students – boys who were amongst the initial intake of 34 students throughout 1903. The entire cumulative student population by the end of 1915 (the latest date at which a boy was the right age to attend school and enlist) was only 804. Therefore 18.5% of the school's entire population since its inception was directly involved the war. If applied to the current 2012 enrolment

of c. 1200 boys from year 5 to year 12, the same percentage would equate to just over 222 boys, or around 8 full classes.

Waverley boys were present in every theatre and every service of the Great War – from Gallipoli to the Western Front, in Egypt and Palestine, in the navy, the army and nascent air force. Bede Kenny was awarded the Victoria Cross during World War One. Several of the boys 'did their bit' in the war to end all wars only to serve again in World War Two;



one of them was Bernard Hindmarsh, who started at Waverley College in 1906 and first enlisted n 1916. He lost his life in the notorious sinking of the Hospital ship A.H.S. Centaur in May 1943.


Initial research has clarified some of the details of the WWI exstudents, including their proper full names and spelling. We hope to update the lists which appear in each student diary in time for the 2013 school year.

It is envisaged that the book will include a 2-page biography of each of the 17 young men who died, plus an outline of the service particulars of each ex-student who served. By way of context (not seeking to re-write history) a



sketch of the battles in which our boys participated will also be included. Updates regarding the progress of the project will appear in future editions of Wavelength. Please contact me if you have any information about the 148 young men who served in WWI, or have connection(s) to their families.

Sport at Waverley this year has seen some impressive results. We continue to have both notable team and individual performances.

The 1st XV Rugby were desperately unlucky not to win the CAS despite probably being the best team in the competition but had some memorable performances. Probably the most notable was the 69-31 win against

Knox at Knox with some very entertaining rugby and outstanding tries scored. Our 15As coached by Mr Chris McBride were rewarded with an undefeated CAS premiership. We had many players in the CAS representative Rugby sides and also eventually had Jack Johnson selected for the NSW I and Australia A sides as a number 7. Rugby is also planning a development tour to Queensland early next year.

Football did not have as much success but played a great brand of football and should be very proud of their efforts. We have a number of players going on a European tour at the end of this year which hopefully should culminate in some positive results in 2013.

Some of the notable recent individual performances include Brendan Madeira at the NSW All School Athletics Championships



with a 1st place in U/17 Long Jump & a 1st place in 110m Hurdles. Brendan now also holds the 110m Hurdles CAS record which stood for a number of years. Brendan will now compete at the National titles.

Conor Moloney also recently competed at the State titles as a Multi-Class swimmer and achieved 1st place in 50m backstroke; 1st in 50m Freestyle and 1st in 100m

Freestyle. Congratulations on some brilliant achievements. Conor demonstrates the courage, bravery and determination typical of a Waverley sportsman!



We have many other students competing at State and National levels in many sports including Sailing, Surfing, Surf Lifesaving; Cycling; Martial Arts as well as the more traditional sports. I am looking forward to seeing these young men develop into our future champions – 'Go the Waves!'

If the late 60's was a halcyon time at Waverley, then a young, ginger-headed Brother from Queensland had a bit to do with it! He was only in his 20's when he arrived, but he quickly made a difference.

And very soon he had a

nickname .. it was PJ! A few Brothers and teachers had them in those days: "Mick", "Smiley", "Gunner", "Dim", "Boris", "Tubby", "Percy", "WX", "murph" it was a mark of recognition.

No Old Boy from that era would remember PJ as "retiring" but in fact he is.now aged 78, PJ is heading back to QLD to a "palatial retirement village" in the grounds of Nudgee College. In August, he was guest of honour at a farewell luncheon with some of his protégés (themselves now in their 50's & 60's).

When at Waverley, PJ taught 'anything and everything' – from Science to English and Latin – with an infectious blend of humour and energy and enthusiasm. Old Boys still remember how the science lab in Ludlow Hall became "his domain" ... with its ancient timber benches and tiered seating and display cases and all manner of specimens. "His lab" became the place where biology and chemistry and physics all became fathomable ... but never lost their mystique. "His students" well remember geology excursions – unheard of in those days – to North Bondi or Prospect or Lapstone ... with as much emphasis on 'rock songs' as geology formations and rock types! They remember him organising the Hall for the May Procession; getting choirs ready for eisteddfods; his involvement with cadets; his passion for music; and ... his diffidence with sport For those fortunate to be taught by him, PJ's love of education is a wonderful legacy. His recall of those days at Waverley is astounding.

After he left Waverley, PJ went on to become headmaster at other schools; attained a PhD in Psychology; and later became involved in pastoral care. Thanks PJ



WALLY FINGLETON 1815-2012

Missionary batted with honour

Wally Fingleton was asked what the secret to Wally Fingleton was asked what the secret to along. flourishing life was. His replywas "Keep breathing".

Father Wally kept breathing into his 98th year, and to his last days remained a friend and mentor to many throughout Australia, Papua New Guinea and the Solomon Islands, where for several decades he served as a missionary. He was renowned for his commonsense, humour, wisdom and compassion for all. He was born two months before the ANZAC landing at Gallipoli, the fifth of six children to Jim and Belinda Fingleton. For several years Jim was the state ALP member for Waverley, but in 1920 life changed dramatically for the Fingleton family when he died of tuberculosis, forcing the children to leave school to sun-

died of tuberculosis, forcing the children to leave school to sup-port the family. Wally, aged five, was held back from school for several years to help his mother run a small seafood shop in Bondi Junction, before winning

a bursary to Christian Brothers College, Waverley. Despite the family setback, the Fingleton clan flourished, son Les becoming the mayor of Waverley, son Jack a renowned Australian Test cricketer and accomplished journalist/ author, and son Glen a courageous trade union organiser on the Sydney wharves.

The Daily Telegraph, to interview his brother Jack on his return from the 1935-36 Australian cricket tour of South Africa

VIPs, walked up to Jack with right
hand outstretched. Jack looked
Wallyup and down and said,
"You've got my bloody tie on."

Like his brothers, Wally was an excellent sportsman, playing first-grade cricket for Waverley, as well as being a competent boxer, rugby player and surfer. After leaving school he worked as a journalist for five years while studying English and philo-sophy at the University of Sydney. He even nau the com-while the shipping reporter for nev. He even had the chance.

Fingleton was proud of the fact that he was "personally sacked" by Frank Packer after he had the temerity to say, "I think you might be wrong on that one, Mr Packer." His life then took a dramatic

detour. On a wet day, a bout of boredom prompted him to pick up a book called Blazing the Trail in the Solomons – a biography of a priest. "After reading the book, I said to myself, this is what I want to do. I wanted to do something worthwhile for others."

to do. I wanted to do something worthwhile for others."
After seven years of study, Fingleton was ordained a Marist priest in 1944. Soon after he achieved his goal of becoming a missionary to the Solomon Islands, where he lived for the next 27 years, often in primitive conditions. He was an inspirational figure, working diligently to improve the education system and fought for the locals over and the state of the land rights. He also helped the Japanese find their dead World War II soldiers. "Ireckon up to 15,000 Japanese died in my parish area," he said.

It all came at a cost, as Father Wally was often afflicted with malaria and tropical ulcers.


malaria and tropical ulcers. Eventually he had to return to Australia when he seemed likely

to lose the sight of one eye. In 1982 he was transferred as parish priest to Bribbaree, where his father had worked as a shearer in the 1890s, and six years later to Taralga, where he was

priest-in-charge. In 1994 he went into retirement, but for many years while based in Crookwell he remained active, relieving priests in rural NSW. Accompanying him in his moves was his assistant, catechist and carer. Mary Connor, who provided support and companionship for more than 30 years. Father Wally remained healthy until suffering a major fall just hours before he died. His nephew Jim Fingleton, Jack's eldest son and Father Wally's first baptism, said in his eulogy: "The night my father

eulogy: "The night my father died, Wally visited him to give him the last rites. Wal said that Jack told him: "Tve had a good innings." On that score, you'd have to say that Wal had a great innings though in the good old Australian tradition, he fell just short of his ton."
Father Wally is survived by his

sister Linda and a multitude of nieces, nephews, great-nieces and nephews and great-greatnieces and nephews. Greg Growden
